

## Syllabus MAT 534 Fall 2013

**Course Description.** MAT 534, Introduction to Abstract Algebra (3 credits). Theory of groups, rings, and fields, including the integers and polynomial rings. Prerequisites: MAT275 or CIS 275, and MAT 331. *This course is designed primarily for mathematics majors.*

**Text.** *Modern Algebra, An Introduction*, by John R. Durbin, John Wiley & Sons, Sixth Edition, 2009. We will cover Chapters I – VI and VIII with some additions and omissions.

**Homework.** Homework will be collected. Questions on examinations will be modeled on homework questions, so it is essential to learn how to solve homework problems.

**Attendance.** Attendance is essential to success in this course; it will be considered.

**Tests.** There will be two or three examinations in lecture during the semester, as well as a final examination covering the entire course. The final examination will be given on Tuesday, December 10, 2013, 12:45PM - 2:45PM in 119 Carnegie. **Do not make plans to leave campus before 2:45pm on Tuesday, December 10.**

**Grading.** The instructor will announce the grading policy. If a student misses an hour examination and has a valid excuse, his or her grade will be based on the relevant part of the final examination; *there will be no makeup examinations*.
