**Course Description:** This is the first course in the 2 semester sequence MAT 601-2. The sequence covers the foundational material for all graduate study in analysis and related fields, and also prepares mathematics graduate students for the department preliminary examination in analysis. MAT 601 will cover the first 5 chapters of <u>Rudin</u>.

**Grading:** There will be two in-class exams as well as a comprehensive final exam. The final exam will be Friday, December 13, 5:15-7:15 p.m. in a room to be announced later. The dates for the in-class exams will be announced later. The two in-class exams will each count towards 25% of the final grade. The final counts 30%, and homework counts 20%.

**Homework:** Homework will be collected regularly and will be graded. It is arguably the most essential part of the course. You cannot learn mathematics by watching someone else perform it any more than you can learn to play the violin by attending a concert. Complete and elegant solutions to all problems in <a href="Rudin">Rudin</a> can easily be found on the internet, placed there by well-intentioned but misguided souls who believe their work is a benefit to humanity. **Do not use these materials!** Doing so constitutes a violation of academic integrity. (See below for more detailed information on Syracuse University's policy on academic integrity.) Try as much as possible to do the homework on your own. If you are stuck, you may ask the professor or fellow students for hints, but you should always give proper credit in your solutions for ideas that are not your own.
