Course Description - Learning Outcomes: After successfully completing this course students will:

- know how to compose, write, read and understand mathematical proofs
- understand basic mathematical logic and set theory
- be able to understand and produce proofs by mathematical induction
- know how to work with the concept of infinity and be aware that some infinities are bigger than others.

Prerequisites: MAT 295.

Credit Restrictions: Credit cannot be given for both CIS 275 and MAT 375.

Homework: Some homework will be designated as "For your practice" other homework will be designated as "To be handed in". "To be handed in" homework is due at the beginning of class on Thursday after it is assigned. It will be graded and count towards your grade for the course. Students are allowed to collaborate on the "To be handed in" homework, but each student must hand in her or his own separate assignments. Collaboration includes working on the problem together or giving hints to other students after you have solved it yourself. It does not include letting someone else simply copy your solution. On the "For your practice" homework students may do whatever they want.

Quizzes: On most Thursdays there will be a quiz near the beginning of class. These will be graded and count toward your grade for the course. There will be no make up quizzes, but the four lowest quiz scores will be dropped.

Exams During the Term: Tuesday, September 30, Thursday, November 13, all during regular class time. Except in very very exceptional circumstances no make up exams will be given. In most cases, instead, the final exam will count extra. Even for that a very good reason for missing the exam is required.
