Course Information: Course Description: Linear equations, Linear transformations, Matrices, n -dimensional Euclidean spaces, Associated geometry. These topics are covered in Chapters 1, 2, 3, 5 and 6.

Calculator Policy: You are NOT allowed to use a graphing or symbolic calculator (such as TI-84, TI-85, etc) on homework, quizzes, and exams for this class. Students may need to show work to receive full credit. In particular no use of calculators will be permitted on quizzes or exams.
