Course Description:

The course will cover parts of Chapters 1, 2, 3, and 5 of the text. Chapter 1 covers the standard properties of topological spaces; Chapter 2 provides a geometric treatment of the classification theorem of surfaces via handlebodies; Chapter 3 introduces the algebraic invariant, the fundamental group; and Chapter 5 considers the special topological spaces: CW complexes.

Similar material can also be found in Chapters 2, 3, 9, 11, and 12 of **Munkres: Topology 2nd Edition;** the treatment however is less geometric.

Exams/Problem Sets: There will be a written midterm exam in the middle of the course and a written final exam. In addition, there may be a project assigned. Your course grade will be based on these exams and project. Problems will be assigned at regular intervals but will not count toward the grade.
