MAT 731 - Rings and Modules Fall 2016

Text: We will not follow very closely any particular textbook so the class notes will be the main source. They can be supplemented by reading for instance *Abstract Modern Algebra* by Rotman, which will be on reserve in the library, although the order of the material is slightly different there.

Prerequisites: MAT 631 and MAT 632.

Course description: The plan is to cover the following topics:

- ✓ **Set-up:** Modules and homomorphisms. Direct sums and products. Free modules. Universal properties. Exact sequences. Diagram chasing. Hom and Tensor. Composition series. Noetherian and Artinian rings and modules.
- ✓ **Noncommutative Ring Theory:** Semisimple rings and modules. Artin-Wedderburn Theorem. Jacobson radical. Nakayama's lemma.
- ✓ **Special Modules:** Projective, Injective and flat modules.
- ✓ **Commutative topic:** Localization

Homework and grades: Homework will be assigned in class and it will count as 40% of your final grade. You may work together on the homework, but you may find that you mature the most mathematically by doing as much as possible by yourself. You are always welcome to come to me for help. In addition we will have two term exams (dates to be announced in class) and each will count 30%.
