Calculator Policy: You are allowed to use a calculator (such as TI-84, TI-85) on homework, quizzes, and exams *for certain calculations*. More specific instructions will be provided in lectures and on quizzes and exams. Students must show work to receive any credit. Commands typed into a calculator do *not* count as work. The use of a symbolic calculator (such as the TI-89 or the TI-Nspire with CAS) is not allowed.

Homework: With a few exceptions, a set of homework problems will be posted after each lecture on Blackboard and collected at the beginning of the next lecture. 20 sets of homework will be collected and each is worth 3 points.

Quiz: With a few exceptions, there will be a quiz at the beginning of each lecture. The quiz will cover the previous lecture. There will be 20 quizzes and each is worth 4 points.

Mid-term exam: There will be 2 in-class mid-term exams: one on Thursday, February 16th and the other on Thursday, March 30th. Each of them is worth 100 points.

Final Exam: The final exam will be given on Monday, May 8th, during a two-hour period between 8:00am and 2:30pm, and at no other time. Do not plan to leave the campus before 3pm on this day. The final exam is cumulative and is worth 160 points.

There will be no make-ups for homework, quizzes, or exams unless you have a truly exceptional excuse, which has to be corroborated by a statement from your doctor, coach, etc.

Grading Policy: Total points possible is 60 (homework) + 80 (quizzes) + 200 (mid-term exams) + 160 (final exam) = 500. A letter grade will be assigned based on the percentage of points that
