Course overview: The main goal of the course is to provide an introduction to modern abstract algebra, primarily groups and rings. This is a proof based course and is primarily intended for mathematics majors.

Text: Contemporary Abstract Algebra, 9th ed., by Joseph Gallian, Brooks/Cole 2017. The course covers most of Chapters 1-11 (Groups) and 12-15 (Rings).

Homework: The regular graded homework assignments are crucial to your development. Working independently on them should help you to learn much more effectively.

The first serious attempt you make on each problem set should be alone with time to think. After that, you may work with others on the homework, provided that you write up your solutions completely independently, that is, in your own words. You are more than welcome to ask questions about homework problems in class and during office hours!

Quizzes: There will be (almost every week) in-class quizzes. They will be based on the assigned homework and/or other exercises from the textbook.

Learning outcomes: In addition to learning the basic theory of groups and rings, the student should learn how to read, understand and write proofs and use abstract mathematical arguments based on axioms and rules of logic.

Examinations: There will be two term exams each counting 25% and a cumulative final exam counting 30% for a total of 80%. The quizzes, homework and class participation will count for the remaining 20% of the final grade. The dates for the term exams will be announced in class. There will be no make-up exams. A missed midterm exam counts as zero unless the student presents a note from the doctor or from the Dean's office stating explicitly that the student was not able to attend. With the note, the final exam grade will be used in place of the missing grade. Everyone is required to take the final exam. Letter grades are determined as follows:
