**Text:** *Number Theory*, by George Andrews, Dover Publications; Elementary and (Gentle) Analytic Number Theory, by J.L. Meyer, unpublished, available at SU Bookstore.

**Catalog Course Description:** Prime numbers, greatest common divisors, congruences. Euler's function, Fermat's theorem, primitive roots, indices, quadratic residues, Legendre and Jacobi symbols, and the quadratic reciprocity law.

PREREQ: ((MAT 375 OR CIS 375) AND MAT 331) OR GRADUATE STANDING IN MATHEMATICAL SCIENCES

**About This Course:** This course is a first course in number theory. The course roughly follows the Meyer text. The Andrews text serves primarily as a back-up reference for the material in the course. The material presented in class will not necessarily correspond to particular chapters of the book. There will be additional topics presented by the instructor and other number theoretic digressions. The work you do for the course will include solving problems with applications from the material and writing proofs of claims (lots of proofs).
