- 3. Chain complexes, homology and homotopy
- 4. Projective and injective resolutions
- 5. Derived functors
- 6. Tor and Ext
- 7. Bicomplexes (aka double complexes), mapping cones
- 8. Basic category theory
- 9. Limits and colimits
- 10. Derived categories
- 11. Triangulated categories
- 12. Spectral sequences

Knowledge of modern homological algebra is essential in many fields.

Final: There will be no final exam, but we may use the time to make up the required hours.

Homework and Grades: Your grade will be based on the regular homework sets.

They will be due in two stages:

- 1. On Mondays, serious attempts/drafts will be due. These should be done independently. I will check them right away so that you can have them back.
- 2. On Wednesdays, final versions will be due. For these you can work together.

However, you may not look up answers to problems in books or on the internet as this will be considered cheating. If you cannot do a problem, then don't turn in an answer.
